#### A Recap of our Progress and Hope for the Future

We are so pleased to present this annual report to you, our supporters, and friends. This year we have begun to come out of our COVID-19 stiftcres. We met the challenge, exhibited our strength of character, and kept true to our mission of providing client-centered care, returning sobriety, good health, and family engagement to those we served.

All the while, we made great strides toward our goals of expanding services in newly constructed buildings, raising funds for the remodeling of our legacy buildings, and improving our processes with employee development and program accreditation.

Construction on Phase I was completed in 2021 and Phase II will be completed by December 2023. Phase III, the remodeling of "Old Main" into the "McCombs Recovery Center," will commence upon completion of Phase II. We are nearing our goal of SS million raised for Phase III, so please look to our website, or call our philanthropy department to see how you can help us complete our the final phase of our campaign.

Lifetime Recovery has always prided itself on collaborating with our partners in recovery, the non-profit sector, and with our community, local and statewide. To that end, we have partnered with Centrolled in providing medical care to our residential clients, two days a week in a newly remodeled clinic housed in what we historically called The Cottage. "This collaboration, supported by Methodist Healthcare Ministries, goes a long way to achieve our desire to provide care for the mind, body, and soirit.

We continue our collaboration with Alpha Home and Rise Recovery in a United Way sponsored program which includes a 24-hour hotline and "warm hand-off" referral services, so that once someone is ready to get help, it is there! We are grateful for the community's support through our annual United Way campaign

During COVID- 9th ecommunity was plagued with overcrowding in our jail population. What was a routine need developed into a desperate problem as more people were incarcretared with no hope of resolution. To that end, Lifetime partnered with Bearz County to provide substance use disorder and co-occuring mental health treatment to those who were arrested for non-violent druing offenses in either pre-trial or jail diversion programs. This helped reduce the jail population while returning an individual to a substance free, mentally supported life. An independent study conducted by North Colorado University found the recibivism rate for those treated at Lifetime was 9% compared to 34% for those returned lifetime was 9% compared to 34% for those returned lifetime for those not enrolled in Lifetime Recovery's programs.

Our clients show their gratitude daily by remaining connected to the recovery community. Whether it is through our recovery coaching programs and peer support groups, the Alumni Association, faith communities or 12-step fellowships, treatment turns into a lifetime of successful living. ### 550 Residential Treatment Clients

Lifetime's residential treatment program focuses on Cognitive- Behavioral Therapy and Trauma Informed Care. Counselors recognize that clients are likely to have suffered a history of trauma and understand the role trauma may play in a client's addiction. Hence, counseling in one-on-one and group settings is focused on working through the trauma to help prevent relapse.




### Phase II Progress Raising funds for Phase III

Phase II includes two new Residential Halls and Counseling Centers that include counseling offices and large group open spaces. These additional facilities will provide more than 80 additional beds, increasing the number of clients we are able to serve. Construction of one new Residential Hall & Counseling Center was completed in February 2023 and construction on the second Residential Hall & Counseling Center is expected to be completed by the end of 2023.

We are currently in the midst of raising \$5 million for Phase III, this includes the renovation of the "Old Main" residential building into the "Red McCombs Recovery Center." Once complete, this Center will have new plumbing, HVAC, and electrical upgrades, two modernized residential halls, remodeled counseling and group rooms, a large auditorium and a new community & family gathering space. Our current goal is to raise the remaining \$1.7 million needed for this final campaign phase by the end of 2023.

# **Mission** Changing Lives Through Comprehensive Treatment of Substance Use Disorders



Lifetime Recovery's programs reduce economic, social, educational, racial, and ethnic disparities in access to behavioral health care by making substance use disorder treatment available to all individuals who need it. No one is ever turned away for lack of financial resources.

Established in 1963, Lifetime Recovery provides Residential Treatment, Outpatient Counseling, Recovery Coaching and Supportive Services to individuals who do not have the financial means to receive care otherwise. Programs are ongoing, year-round and reduce economic, social, educational, racial, and ethnic disparities in access to behavioral healthcare.

### **Our Programs:**

### **Residential Program**

Lifetime's 45-to-90-day Residential Treatment provides clients with Cognitive-Behavioral Therapy, Moral Reconation Therapy, and Trauma Informed Care. A treatment plan is devised with goals established by clients and their counselor. While in treatment, clients participate in group activities, individual and group therapy.

### **Outpatient Program**

Outpatient Counseling provides treatment to men and women in the least restrictive setting. Clients take part in 2 to 3 classes per week for a period of 3 to 6 months depending on their treatment plans.

### **Supportive Services**

Supportive Services are short term and engage clients on referral lists and complete treatment introductions once admitted. Clients attend peer support groups and are assisted with ID recovery, transportation, nutrition and education. Recovery Coaching is long term. Clients receive support to maintain recovery capital focusing on wellness, legal matters, and sober housing.

### A 2021 study done for Bexar County

by the University of Northern Colorado found that individuals who received residential treatment through the jail diversion program had a 9% recidivism rate compared to 39% for the individuals who didn't receive residential treatment. Data shows that Lifetime programs increase rates of family reunification and stable employment, while reducing incidents of child neglect and abuse, homelessness, emergency room visits, recidivism, and the reliance on government subsidies.

"I drank and used drugs for years. I was not allowed to be around my son. I entered Lifetime's residential program in August 2022 and graduated in November 2022. When I left Lifetime, I moved into a sober living home and on August 24, 2023, I will celebrate 1 year of sobriety.
